

# **Manzanita Ridge Neighborhood Park**

Summary from the third round of public outreach (October 2023)

This 3.5-acre site will provide a new neighborhood park for surrounding residents. The park neighbors district-owned natural area with soft-surface trail connections that will remain as undeveloped open space. In our last round of outreach, we learned more about the features and amenities residents would like to see. We used the feedback we received to inform three conceptual designs for the park.

#### **Concept 1: Enhanced Nature**

The concept for this design is an enhanced nature trail experience. The main activity in this park is exploring trails that highlight the natural beauty of the site. The existing site is protected and restored to blend with the natural environment. Along trails native plants will be added to increase the interest and add to the diversity. A few concentrated areas are designed to focus play, activity, and small neighborhood gatherings, while a large native grass turf area in the most disturbed section of the site provides flexible space for gathering or a picnic.

# **Concept 2: Modern Stargazing**

The Modern Stargazing Park has an angular design layout that contrasts with the surrounding nature trails and open space. The paths are direct from one area to another and are decided by desire lines to viewpoints or other points of interest in the park. The sidewalks are wide and plaza like inviting the neighborhood into the park. Modern features fill the park play equipment with clean lines and straight forward color. The park also celebrates the views into the open space edge and star viewing at night. Follow the light inlaid path to a sky viewing plaza at night or have a picnic in the shady pines and play bocce during the day.

# **Concept 3: Nature Discovery and Art**


The Nature Discovery and Art Park is explored by pathways with activity nodes along that path, and larger gathering spaces where the paths come together. The park incorporates play, exercise, gathering plazas, shade, picnic, and learning nodes. Each node has a nature theme to discover. These themes show up artistically (sculptural, mural), thematically, or physically and tell a story about the place (Central Oregon, high desert, canyon bluff, urban edge) and its creatures.

The outreach consisted of an online survey and two open house meetings. The survey was open from October 9-20, 2023 and received 138 responses. It was emailed directly to HOA managers, the Summit West Neighborhood Association and to individuals on the project information list. It was also available on the project website. An onsite open house took place October 15, there were approximately 40 attendees. A second open house was held at the district office on October 18, and there were four attendees.

# Q2: Briefly describe what you like about your preferred option.

### Concept 1

## More natural

It appears to fit the site and the surrounding neighborhoods the best

#### Most natural

It most resembles the current natural landscape, is the least 'disruptive' visually and blends (the most) seamlessly into the existing forest lands to the west.

Flows naturally into surrounding area, creates opportunities for native species and nearby (human) families, has the lease amount of impact and flora, fauna and conserves water resources and preserve nighttime darkness.

Most natural version.

Least intrusive and disruptive.

Focus on nature and uncluttered layout.

It retains the natural environment. I like the low water native desert grass lawn, preservation of native trees, and minimal addition of human built environment. Option 3 is far too built up; a maple grove does not belong amidst all of the beautiful natural pines that currently live there! Option 2's proposal for ground lighting is just not workable. The lights will be expensive, difficult to maintain, and will detract from the natural night sky and ability to stargaze.

# Most natural

I love that it seamlessly blends with the natural landscape and is low water.

Large turf area, wildflower meadow, exercise equipment trail, that the area is kept very natural. And that there is No big play structure and No basketball court.



We don't need a lot of fancy amenities, just quality usable space.

The overall aesthetic - more natural, and it fits well with the site.

More natural. Looks easier and less expensive to build.

It will stand the test of time. Im concerned that there options may not wear well over time.

This option seems the least intrusive to the landscape.

I like the fact that this plan will protect and restore the native desert landscape, and it creates more of a buffer between the homes on the south end of the park. And I've always loved trees and wildflowers! ;-)

The area around Shevlin is known for its raw beauty. I think keeping the park as close to native as possible best celebrates the spirit of this area.

I like the multiple natural play areas for kids over animal themed park as it is more fun for all ages and leads to creative play

Exercise equipment, having picnics, playing on the park

1) Focuses on enhancing the natural beauty of the area we all live here to enjoy, without more unnecessary human-created impact from structures/lighting/non-native landscaping. Split rail fence vs. steel seems to follow the look/feel of the surrounding natural areas. 2) Lawn is noted to be "native desert grass" which is important given we live in a high desert and water availability is going to become increasingly difficult in the years to come. It would be very shortsighted to landscape with water-intensive plants/turf.

Consistent with natural environment. Other options have things like a basketball court which is concrete.

# Help protect/restore wooden land areas

I like that it is most natural, the low key exercise trail, and has something for everyone in a nonintrusive way. I am really bothered by option 2, which feels like it would ruin the entire feel of the area. This is a nice place to live and enjoy because it is very quiet, natural, and gives you space to breathe. A parkour course and over groomed area with big structures sounds like an eyesore and opportunity to create all sorts of problems. Trash, noise, loitering, the only thing that could make it worse would be a pickle ball court.

"Enhanced Nature" provides the least impact to the adjacent natural environment. The other two have playground structures, ugh, and lighting, which is ridiculous given the setting and the lifestyles of the woodland and migratory birds and animals in the area. Keep the wild wild!

I feel strongly that option 1 is the best option because it honors the Key Takeaway #1 from the survey: Nature Rules! It keeps play area for kids, but it is nature themed (so no colorful plastic, etc.). I appreciate the split rail fencing. I like that there are no evening/night lights.

#1 most in keeping w the natural surroundings & seems to prerequisite greatest # of existing trees. Definitely don't like #2; too stark w the angular lines.#3 gimmicky w animal themed playground.

Least complex, most nature forward, nothing that would cause unwelcome noise to neighbors

I like number 1 because if the wooden balance beams and working out with my Dad.

My preferred option is Option 1. It focuses on Soft Surface Walking, Observing Nature, Natural Areas, Shade, and Play for Children. I like many of the concepts of Option 3. A combination of the two is preferable.

The design integrates well with the natural areas bordering the park. I don't feel like a more traditional playground is needed here since there is a traditional playground at three pines park which is pretty close to this new park. The exercise equipment is something we don't have much of in town, and I love the addition.

I really really like the wildflower areas and the native grass lawn (vs normal lawn). I also like the natural play area (vs normal plastic play area)

People desperately need to connect with nature at this moment in human history. This option feels the most organic to me and the easiest way to make that connection. The only thing I would add to it is a horseshoe/bocce area for community building opportunities. I like keeping the children's play area as organic as possible. Oftentimes the simple natural ones are the most appealing and provide the most opportunity for imagination to flourish.

## Concept 2

# Q3: Is there anything you do not like in your preferred concept design? If so, please describe.

#### Concept 1

I don't like the added fence and weird connection to existing paths heading to Tumalo Creek. I don't love the exercise equipment pathway either.

Would like it to connect to the trails behind including Manzanita and the current "goat path" towards the neighborhood behiind

I am not sure how many folks will use the exercise structures

Bathroom on street.

Seasonal toilet should be further from sidewalk and surrounded by vegetation.

I do not like that the large shelter and plaza are located right on the road. They should be moved west and south, so that they are tucked away from the road and existing houses along that road. It will give both picnickers and those living in the neighborhood privacy.

Seasonal toilet, if it must exist, move it away from the street and hide with plants.

I'm not sure that the exercise equipment will get a ton of use. Perhaps not worth the cost.

I'd prefer to have no shade trees added to the turf area or the south end of the park at all. I am very afraid of losing the mountain views. I'd prefer to have no play area at all. But if we have to have one, the nature play area would be my choice, and I would like to see it moved to the opposite side of



the wildflower meadow. With any play area, again if we have to have one, I'd like for it to be as far from the street side as possible for noise reduction.

We think the playground would be better with more traditional play equipment. It isn't clear how large the covered shelter will be - maybe it should be larger? (seating for 12-15 seems reasonable?)

Lack of seating options (benches or other seats scattered through the park)

I do not want playgrounds and exercise equipment in these designs. Thus, ideally these elements would be removed.

#### Nope, love it!

1) Consider a minimum buffer on the south side that's just "native desert landscape", perhaps 30-40 feet if that can be done. 2) I prefer Concept 3 that keeps the existing Manzanita trailhead and enhances it with "educational signage". I think "exercise equipment" is often unused. 3) Could the "seasonal toilet" be moved to the existing Manzanita trailhead area across from Jackwood Place, still close to Mt. Hood Drive? Many trails have a toilet located at their trailhead, and that provides more distance from existing homes.

I would prefer that the Manzanita Trail stay where it is now, at the north end of the park, and that the seasonal toilet also be moved to the north end of the park, away from homes, and by where the Manzanita trail is currently.

## I really like it!

No. Looks great. I definitely do not like the option with the basketball court, primarily because of the basketball court. I think that would be a noise nuisance.

# Lacks picnic area

1) The "exercise equipment trail through pines" seems unlikely to ever be widely used. This was not a priority in the previous outreach, and have rarely seen this concept widely used in other parks across the country that have tried. Also, the "large shelter/plaza" and "nature playground" areas should not be located directly on Mt Hood, in order to minimize potential nuisance/disturbance to residents living directly adjacent to the park. Smaller picnic/shelter areas tucked back away from the street create more privacy, and less likely to become a nuisance.

Bacci court might be nice as it could be decomposed granite.

Exercise equipment, shelter, fencing.

Worried about parking - this is a neighborhood and I see 2 handicap spots. Hoping on street/curb parking will not be allowed. The small Shevlin Park lot by the main road already overflows into 3 pines and Shelvin Commons. The view is great at night and hope the park does not have any lights to disturb this. "Seasonal Bathroom" presents concern about necessity (for all) and attracting homeless.

Do not support seasonal toilet and rain garden for a neighborhood park (this is NOT a public park); risks of misuse for both, not to mention waste of \$ and costly to maintain. The turf should be drought resistant if included.

No Bocce Ball court. No maple or aspen grove

I'm very disappointed in the omission of an off-leash dog park.

Would prefer more trees

Not really; overall, it's ok.

The option picked is pretty good. I can see wanting the items there for kids to senior and all in between, it looks like a good mix. A bench of two would be nice or small cafe sized table in a spot of shade to have a cup of coffee or snack, but not necessary.

I think it will be important to encourage walkers to stay on the existing path in the district owned area, and not create a lot of different paths zigzagging through the open space area heading towards Shevlin Park.

I think Concept 1 is fantastic, in its entirety!

Where the seasonal toilet is placed. I think the toilet should be placed in the NW Corner away from the streets and the homes. the NW Corner may be difficult to get to for cleaning, but with the Manzanita Trail there, I'm hoping that change can be made. Also, I don't think trees that take a lot of water are appropriate. Maples and Aspen groves are lovely but not in this location. Any trail should be as far away from the homes as possible. The Trail on Option 3 on the south side is too close to those homes.

Consider making the nature play area larger. Perhaps expand into the wildflower meadow.

Would prefer more seating. More art could be nice.

I like it all - would add a bocce/horseshoe area as mentioned above

I would like a permanent toilet vs. seasonal, and not sure about exercise equipment. Most people I see in that area are just walking in the area, not going to work out. With our smoky summers, few people choose to be outside to do exercise, so I wonder if that part is needed vs more landscaping of tree or nature exploration.

Don't like the fence extending into the Buffer Area on the west side or the Nature Exploration Area right at the edge of the park. Not sure a rain garden fits the theme of native planting.

Maple grove: use vine maples, native willows, aspen, larch or another 1-2 native tree species that provide fall color. paved paths: too many. Eliminate southern-most path and one short path in middle of park running E-W from the turf to an unnamed half-circle area with large pine and does not connect to other trails. Boulder retaining walls: try to use native dark lava of irregular sizes rather than just Knife River or there grey quarry stone. Picnic Plaza: reduce number of tables from seven to four. Seven tables will not get used at any one time, and turf provides picnic opportunities as well. "Activity Nodes Typical": I have no idea what these are but they seem superfluous. Astronomy viewing area with lounge chairs: nice idea but perhaps any area of park away from downlighting will provide the same opportunity and I cantle rationalize lounge chairs which I would replace with a bench long enough for 5-6 people (trio plus couple with space between). Shade trees: What species? Might take decades to grow and that's okay with me, but they should be native. Maybe black cottonwoods? They could be planted in excavated swales for wetness.

# Turf area

No parking! Neighborhood parks provide variety for all, not just those who can afford to live in these wealthy areas.

#### No

I would love to see more fencing around play areas for young kids and kids with developmental disabilities in Bend. We do not have any playgrounds that are fully fenced in. This is a safety concern that the parks have not addressed.

Keeping the area as natural as possible while retaining access to trails like manzanita, western larch and railroad are the top priorities

We'd love to see signage/ placards noting the importance of preserving surrounding natural habitat areas and no lighting because of its impact on native species and star gazing.

Please keep nature scape in mind.

Shevlin West is a special nook that borders a ton of open space with existing soft surface trails for walkers and bikers. This community and multigenerational residents would greatly benefit from having so many activities to partake in this concept and would adhere to all takeaways. The basketball court was a huge highlight as many homes put individual hoops and squeeze them into driveways.



The pathway with lighting is the coolest thing I've ever seen and would be so great as Shevlin West is a dark Sky community - it would greatly enhance the effort and provide the outcome of being able to enjoy the views as a community.

Not wanted: basketball court, geology theme, toilet, typical kids plastic play structure. Highly desired: beautiful trees with great fall colors, plenty of open grass space for free play: frisbee, soccer ball, throwing a football. Also desired: a few park benches, basic parkour for adult excercise. If there is a kid's play area, make it simple and natural.

If possible, work to keep some open views to the mountains, especially to the North Sister.

I appreciate the options produced to-date, and the manner in which we can access them and provide these comments. I would like this to be a neighborhood park designed to meet the needs of people living within 1/2 mile. ADA parking for two cars makes sense. Parking for bikes or more cars does not make sense. Please do not try to accommodate the needs of other developments in construction or being planed, or try to meet the needs of overflow parking for Shevlin Park. Consider signage disallowing parking along the park-side of adjoining city streets. The design should take a 30-yr view (one generation of people) looking forward and utilize tree species and constructed amenities accordingly.

Overall, thank you for all the work you're doing on this park. It is so important to the residents living nearby.

I've read all of the Outreach summary, and the overriding impression I'm left with is that my community wants nature, solitude, peace, and a place to gather. Out of the many comments in the summary, I think there were three that mentioned sports like tennis, pickleball, basketball, and bocce ball. Most wanted a place to escape the noise. I heard the need for a playground at the last Open House, and your #1 and #3 plans provided those in perfect alignment with this area. They, too, are in keeping with the nature we're asking for. Thank you for taking all of our many comments and opinions into consideration. That is quite a huge job and we appreciate you doing that!

1) Please keep dogs ON LEASH. Strongly oppose off leash dogs in the new neighborhood park. We already have a huge problem with off leash dogs on all Shevlin Park trails (not a good thing with both young and old, and for those on bikes). I've been spooked by off leash dogs running into the brush and surrounding nature without their owners in sight. Personally encountered off leash dog owner violators even with signs present (dogs intimating my young grandkids while on their bicycles; some dog owners simple self centered and refuse to follow community rules). 2) Many violators (with and without dogs) are not staying on trails and deliberately crossing over onto buffer zone between Neighborhood Park and Shevlin Commons Community, which is not a good thing. PLEASE CONSIDER PLACEMENT OF continuous split rail fencing along the entire border to prevent the public taking short cuts and creating additional and unnecessary a "rat nest" of casual trails.

Bathroom and drinking fountain are ideal as well. Also, would appreciate having a dog poop trash station. Makes it easier for people to clean up after their pets if the receptacle with bags above are included in case they forget to bring their own.

You are doing a GREAT job. I really appreciate the efforts to support all potential users while not moving too far from the natural theme of the area. Please skip the basketball court, lots of opportunity for the other places.

It would be really nice to have a dog-run area, even just space that runs along the perimeter of the fence. I want to be clear here, not a true dog park, just some space that gives the ability to have our pups pump out their energy since Shevlin Park is an on-leash park and we 100% want to respect/encourage that. Also, a couple of managed trash cans would be great. The more attractive our park is, the more litter/dog poop bags that will stack up!

Option 2 can be found in many other city parks. Far distant 3rd choice.

Please do not do #2. Turf, basketball, parkour... sounds like a good way to ruin such a pretty place with what will look like nice junk. Please keep it natural and understated. A nice place for kids to explore nature, adults to relax and enjoy and engage in some fitness before setting off on the trails. This is not NW crossing and as tasteful as I'm sure it would be, natural it would not. I'm curious what the parking situation will be or is this for the neighborhoods? My house overlooks this area and I bought our house for the quiet, natural beauty, not a sanitized park with fake grass and colorful equipment marring the best view, the mountains and Shevlin.

Field for kids and dogs to play is needed. Comfortable seating for stars and mountain sunset viewing. All too often in this end of town people complain about traffic and kids...this park should be for kids! There are plenty of walking opportunities in Shevlin Park.

The "Enhanced Nature" design rubric seems to also be the lowest cost, to my untrained eye at least. Our taxes are high enough already. There is a limit to Bend's spending...if you want a tax revolt, keep it up. Why this park is being paid for by property taxes on all of us and not from this ridiculous new dense development in a once bucolic and tranquil ranch setting (filled with megafauna, small woodland animals, and birds) is beyond me. Frugality is a virtue. Keep the wild, wild.

I think it will be important to encourage walkers to stay on the existing path in the district owned area, and not create a lot of different paths zigzagging through the open space area heading towards Shevlin Park.

Please, please no basketball court or pickleball court. These both will bring about unwelcome noise for neighbors.
